JUNE IS NATIONAL SAFETY MONTH

June's National Safety Month highlights a month of safety topics that lead to continuous improvement in workplace safety. The first week (June 1-7) focuses on strengthening safety programs, assessing risks, and updating safety policies and training. This continuous improvement process ensures a proactive approach to safety, minimizing risks and creating a safer working environment.



One way to improve safety is to look at work processes (how we complete the work). Where can improvements be made to your units works tasks?

Continuous improvement in facilities services involves a systematic and ongoing approach to identify and implement improvements in all aspects of facility operations. This includes everything from maintenance and operations to space planning and energy efficiency. A culture of continuous improvement encourages all stakeholders, including facility managers, maintenance staff, service providers, and occupants, to actively participate in the enhancement of facility operations.



HEAT AWARENESS DAY

Today is Heat Awareness Day and the kickoff to our summer heat safety initiative.

Key aspects of heat awareness include:

Response:

Without additional information, it is very difficult to properly respond to this comment. However, no Department wide salary increases have been processed since the last market/merit increase in July 2024. As you may or may not be aware, the UT Board of Trustees approved a 3% across the board raise for all faculty and staff that was effective 1 July 2024. The amount was unrelated to your annual evaluation score and was based only on your salary...the lowest salary increase was \$0.43, so we are unaware of the \$0.26 or \$0.21 raises you mentioned in your comment.

Your most recent annual assessment score will be utilized in this coming July's merit increase. If you have more a specific question, it is recommended that you address it with your Supervisor or your Director so all pertinent information can be conveyed and a more specific response could be provided.
